2.0 Meeting Summary

From February 8-9, 2023, the Florida Motorcycle Safety Coalition (FMSC) held its second meeting for the 2022-2023 grant cycle. The February 2023 Coalition Meeting was open to all members, guests, and the public. The meeting was held at the University of South Florida, Center for Urban Transportation Research (CUTR)..

Day One (February 8th): The first half of the February Coalition Meeting was held in the afternoon of Day One. Ms. Edie Peters, FDOT, welcomed the Coalition and gave a presentation providing updates on key coalition achievements since the previous meeting. Next, Ms. Tracy Lee, Highway Safety Services, provided an overview of recent efforts to develop educational materials to improve awareness of motorcyclists among motorists. Dr. Chanyoung Lee, CUTR, provided a review of Florida motorcycle crash data. Next, Dr. Patricia Byers, Ryder Trauma Center – Miami, presented the results of her toxicology analysis of motorcycle crash patients. The meeting concluded with a large-group discussion of key opportunities to promote motorcyclist safety, led by Ms. Peters.

Day Two (February 9th): On Day Two, general announcements were made by Ms. Edie Peters, FDOT. Next, Mr. Billy Hattaway, FDOT, provided a presentation on the Vision Zero and Safe Systems approach relative to motorcycle safety. The Coalition broke into Emphasis Areas to review their Motorcycle Safety Strategic Plan (MSSP), Business Plan, followed by a report out and large group discussion. The meeting concluded with a public comment period. No comments were made by the public.

3.0 Coalition Meeting Notes

Welcome and Program Updates - Ms. Edie Peters, FDOT

Ms. Edie Peters, FDOT, opened the meeting with introductions and a review of meeting protocol. Ms. Peters also presented a list of topics for the Coalition to consider for further discussion.

Florida Motorcycle Safety Program Update

Ms. Peters provided an overview of updates to the Motorcycle Safety Strategic Plan (MSSP) Business Plan by emphasis area since the previous meeting.

Advocacy & Policy is monitoring proposed bills and updating educational materials, including a 2-page article on child passenger safety for Full Throttle Magazine. The team conducted a of other states' judicial review procedures and found five states with judicial discretion to order motorcyclespecific traffic course. Building upon this, the team is exploring options to request public records on motorcycle cases. The team is also working with insurance agents to help promote motorcycle safety.




Figure 1. Ms. Peters presenting program updates.

- Communications & Outreach developed a "riding retirement" card and is scheduling meetings with insurance companies to help promote materials. The team attended several outreach events and has multiple upcoming opportunities for members to volunteer. Dates and locations for upcoming events were shared with members. Ms. Peters also shared a new effort for multi-state messaging for large motorcycle events using the tag #RideSMART2Daytona. A Coalition Member Communications survey was shared with members.
- Data & Analysis obtained preliminary data for Telemetered Traffic Monitoring Sites and Portable
 Traffic Monitoring Sites detection and classification accuracy. The team is working on a technical
 report.
- Rider Licensing & Training is working with FLHSMV to develop Florida-specific questions for the
 online motorcycle test. FLHSMV is also working to send endorsement mailers by March. The team
 will also collaborate with the Communications team to develop video messaging for advanced
 training to share in dealership or training schools.
- Law Enforcement is exploring the idea of surveying law enforcement agencies. Crash hotspot maps were shared online in December on RSF website. The common violation fact sheet is undergoing additional updates to ensure materials can fit in officer ticket book.
- Roadway Engineering wants to collaborate with younger engineers to help summarize the
 information in the best practices guide. The team will continue to explore avenues for reporting
 road hazards. The Motorcycle Engineering presentation was completed, with over 300 attendees.
- Trauma & Emergency Services completed 94 "survive the ride" presentations, as well as LEL trainings. The team also explored injury burdens and found extremity fractures were the most

expensive injures. Dr. Byers spoke on her idea for a scene "pit crew" to reduce pre-hospital scene time for motorcyclists involved in crashes. The Trauma and Emergency Services team has several studies which they will complete and present at upcoming meetings.

Enhancing Motorcyclist Safety Awareness in Education, Licensing and Outreach –

Tracy Lee, Highway Safety Services

Ms. Tracy Lee, Highway Safety Services, provided a presentation on motorcyclist awareness in driver education and licensing materials. Historically, motorcycle topics in driver education are limited due to time and content space. Supplementary materials were developed to address this gap. Motorist education can be provided through driver education, remedial traffic safety courses, and reinforced in communications campaigns. Ms. Lee asked the Coalition to think of activity ideas to increase motorcycle awareness among motorists.

Ideas from the Coalition for activities to promote awareness included:

- Virtual simulation or game to watch for motorcycles
- "Punch Buggy" for Bikes
- In-car bingo game to watch for motorcycles
- Educating motorists to turn head to look instead of relying on mirrors

HSS assembled a working group of subject matter experts to determine high priority topics. Ms. Lee opened the same question up to the Coalition and gave members time to submit their top priorities, which were assembled in a word cloud (See Figure 3).

Based on priority areas identified by the working group, a driver awareness brochure was developed and is available on the NHTSA website. The working group also created activities, graphics, and a question pool for driver education programs.

Survive the Ride Toxicology Analysis – Dr. Patricia Byers, Ryder Trauma Center

Dr. Patricia Byers, Ryder Trauma Center, reviewed substance abuse in motorcycle and scooter crash victims. The study included 104 patients' blood samples. The study looked at vehicle type, patient gender/age, prevalence of alcohol and illicit substances and their prevalence across subjects, crash times etc. Motorcycle and scooter crash study groups were fairly equal. The study found 57% of motorcycle crash patients had illicit drugs in their systems and 31% in scooter group. In the group as a whole, 20% had alcohol in their system, 80% of which were over the legal limit. Scooter riders had more riders with no alcohol or drugs present. Marijuana & metabolites were the most common drug, but Dr. Byers noted it is challenging to

determine if the rider was actually "high" while riding, or if they just had residual THC in their system. Younger riders had higher toxicology results than older riders. The population was predominantly male. The information found from the analysis can be utilized to develop educational materials, including resources for law enforcement to identify riders under the influence. Specifically, the Coalition discussed developing educational materials that emphasize the impact drugs can have on survivability.

Florida Motorcycle Crash Update – Dr. Chanyoung Lee, CUTR

reached 620 motorcycle fatalities in 2022. It is unclear how much Covid has impacted these numbers. When examining crashes over ten years, Florida observed an increase in registrations, endorsements, fatalities, while observing a decrease in motorcycle crashes. This could mean people are taking more risks when riding, however it is an incomplete understanding of the changes without Motorcycle Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) information. Florida observed a large increase in crashes and fatalities for riders under age 40 and age 70 and up. Dr. Lee also presented the estimated helmet use by age group using crash data . significant factors

Day Two Welcome & Discussion – Ms. Edie Peters, FDOT

Ms. Edie Peters, FDOT, welcomed the Coalition and opened up the floor for a large group discussion on promoting helmet use. The group provided their insight on the promotion of helmet-use, emphasizing Florida training schools' role in promoting helmet use in new riders. Each school may have a different approach to emphasizing gear usage. Mr. Michael Dobbs shared that his school stopped loaning helmets for the BRC during COVID and saw that people were investing in good helmets. The group felt that RiderCoaches play an important role in rider behaviors. Mr. Jeff Smith also suggested utilizing helmet diagrams illustrating their ventilation and air flow, to remedy riders' misconceptions about helmet discomfort, especially in hot weather.

Ms. Peters also announced her intention to have an official assessment of the Florida Motorcycle Safety Program in 2024. The emphasis area leaders meeting will occur on the morning before the May meeting.

Mr. Billy Hattaway, Ferh & Peers, presented

on the role of sprawl and separated land uses in traffic safety challenges. Florida often tops the country in dangerous road design. Finding funding to support traffic safety is challenging, but FDOT has several safety initiatives. However, motorcyclists are often left out of vulnerable road user considerations. Safe road users, safe vehicles, safe speeds, safe roads, and safe road design are the elements of redundancy built into the Safe Systems approach to reduce risk. Mr. Hattaway emphasized the role of saccadic masking, which makes it difficult to see objects in motion, in motorcycle safety.

Emphasis Area Group Discussion Report Out & Group Discussion

The following highlights from group discussions were presented to the Coalition:

- Advocacy and Policy reported that several tasks are on-hold until after elections. There is a recent proposed legislation about the operation of electric bikes and motorized scooters to have municipal governments to enact local restrictions. The team will keep an eye on this item.
- **Communications** plans to reach out to SF4L on the distribution of the "Riding Retirement" card. Tax collectors' offices have started sharing a 'Watch for Motorcycles' and 'Endorsement promotion" videos in their offices. CUTR will start sending the outreach event calendar to all members. The team had the idea to develop a media packet for May with links and local data.
- Data is collaborating with the Florida Department of Health (DOH) to retrieve information on 2020
 motorcycle crash costs. There is a delay due to discrepancies in the data. The data group is also
 trying to obtain aggregate cause of death data from DOH. The team will publish updated county
 hotspot maps around May 2023.
- Engineering discussed ideas for providing a document for new engineers by adapting the concepts
 from the presentation into a graphic. The information will be piecemeal and contain best
 practices, countermeasures, and standards. The engineering team will provide the information to
 CUTR for design assistance and CUTR will place engineering slides on the website.
- Rider Licensing and Training discussed the development of a question bank for online testing for endorsement. The team also discussed the impact of the new e-course (EP1x11) on the passing rate of new riders.
- Trauma and Emergency Services wants to add first responder training information to the Ride Smart Florida website. The team also discussed approaching motorcycle clubs and groups about safe helmet removal practices and distributing helmets. The group also wants to create laminate

cards for course graduates. The group plans to approach the Florida Impaired Driving Coalition with their presentation on toxicology study results.

The meeting wrapped with further large-group discussion. Members discussed opportunities to reach motorcycle club/group leaders through helmet removal training and annual meetings.

Last, Dr. Chanyoung Lee, briefly reviewed findings from the BRC student survey and highlighted the number of students who already own a motorcycle prior to taking the BRC. The Coalition discussed the implications of people buying bikes before being endorsed. The BRC also received highly positive feedback from riders, regardless of their prior riding experience. Dr. Lee explained that the positive view towards training and trainers represents an opportunity for RiderCoaches to positively influence new riders.

Coalition members were reminded of upcoming Coalition meeting dates again, and the meeting concluded with a public comment period. No comments were made by the public.
